Dr. Doug Kmiec

Topic: Mid-term election-

Is that a train or a light at the end of the tunnel?

One of America's best known scholars and popular commentators on the law, Professor Douglas W. Kmiec holds the endowed chair in constitutional law at the Pepperdine Law School. He came to this position after serving several years as Dean & St. Thomas More Professor of Law at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., and for nearly two decades, on the law faculty at the University of Notre Dame. Beyond the university setting, Kmiec served Presidents Ronald Reagan and George Bush during the years 1985 to 89 as constitutional legal counsel [Assistant Attorney General, Office of Legal Counsel, U.S. Department of Justice], a position previously held by the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist and Justice Antonin Scalia. President Reagan gave high praise to Kmiec's Presidential lawyering, calling it "even-handed" and an example of "exceptional public service." During this period, Kmiec worked closely with now Chief Justice John Roberts and literally side-by-side with now Associate Justice Sam Alito.

A wide-ranging writer and engaging speaker, Professor Kmiec writes a syndicated column for the Catholic News Service and for several years wrote a regular column in the *Chicago Tribune*. He is also a frequent contributor to the pages of the *Los Angeles Times*, *Wall Street Journal*, and other periodicals. He is the co-author of three books on the constitution -- *The American Constitutional Order; Individual Rights and the American Constitution* and *The History, Structure and Philosophy of the American Constitution*.

Professor Kmiec's scholarly research spans legal and non-legal subjects, from the Constitution and the federal system to land use and the organization of America society. He has appeared on *Meet the Press* and national news programs, such as the *News Hour* and *Nightline* and a frequent guest on NPR's *Morning Edition*, *Talk of the Nation*, and *All Things Considered*, analyzing constitutional and political questions.

A White House Fellow (1982-83), Professor Kmiec is one of a few individuals who has received the Distinguished Service Award from two cabinet departments -- the Department of Justice in 1987 and Housing and Urban Development in 1983. In 1988, he was awarded the Edmund J. Randolph Award by the Attorney General. He has lectured on the U.S. Constitution in Asia as a Fulbright Distinguished Scholar.

An honors graduate of Northwestern, Professor Kmiec received his law degree from the University of Southern California, where he received the Legion Lex Commencement Prize for Legal Writing. He is a member of the bar of the U.S. Supreme Court and the state bars of Illinois and California. Professor Kmiec is married to Carolyn Keenan Kmiec and the father of five children.

NOVEMBER BALLOT MEASURES

A brief title and CFRW's official position on the November ballot measures is as follows:

- * Proposition 1A: Transportation Funding/Protection, **SUPPORT**

- * Proposition 1C: Affordable Housing Bonds, **OPPOSE**
- * Proposition 1D: School Bonds, **OPPOSE**
- * Proposition 1E: Disaster Preparedness/Flood Protection Bonds, **NO POSITION (McClintock recommends NO)**
- * Proposition 83: Jessica's Law, **SUPPORT**
- * Proposition 84: Water Bonds, **OPPOSE**
- * Proposition 85: Abortions for Minor Girls: Waiting Period/Parental Consent, **SUPPORT**
- * Proposition 86: Tobacco Tax, **OPPOSE**
- * Proposition 87: Oil Severance Tax, **OPPOSE**
- * Proposition 88: Property Parcel Tax, School Funding, **OPPOSE**
- * Proposition 89: Public Campaign Financing, **OPPOSE**
- * Proposition 90: Eminent Domain Reform, **SUPPORT**

ACTION ALERT

The Governor has until the end of the month to sign or veto the following bills. The CFRW recommends that you call the Governor and ask that he veto these bills.

AB 606 would require the State Board of Education to revise the state curriculum frameworks, opening the door to curriculum that teaches moral equivalency and acceptance of all lifestyles, under the threat of the withholding of education dollars.

State Red Tape Trips Up Green Energy Efforts

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger prepares this week to sign into law the nation's most ambitious effort to address global warming, a key component of California's push to reduce greenhouse gas emissions -- increasing the use of renewable power to create electricity -- has faltered. Despite overwhelming public and political support for renewable power, ratepayer contributions of \$319 million, and a 2002 law mandating a dramatic increase in the use of sun and wind to create megawatts, California has boosted its use of renewable energy by less than 1 percent of the state's overall electricity use in the past four years.

Driver's License Bill Vetoed By Governor

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger vetoed legislation Thursday to allow illegal immigrants to obtain California driver's licenses, marking the eighth consecutive year such proposals have died. Senate Bill 1162 was a far weaker proposal than had been pushed in years past, recognizing the string of defeats and bitter political friction over the issue in an election year. The veto marked one of dozens of actions taken Thursday by Schwarzenegger, who is racing to meet a deadline of midnight Saturday to sign or veto about 500 bills remaining on his desk.
